# SCAN IS NOW AVAILABLE FOR YOU TO READ ONLINE, THANKS TO OUR SHERINGTON WEBMASTER IAN COLLINGE:

Here is Ian's helpful guide to those of you who are not familiar with all the technical procedures.

To make it as easy as possible for you to access SCAN online, we've made it available on two websites ('sherington.org.uk' and 'issuu.com') and in three different formats. Just choose whichever you find most convenient from the following options:

Use the link <a href="www.sherington.org.uk/scan">www.sherington.org.uk/scan</a> to take you directly to the SCAN page where you will see three links to the current issue: 'PDF version', 'Word version', 'ISSUU version'. Just click on the one you prefer. If you are not a 'computer geek' and do not understand technical terms such as 'PDF', don't worry, just click on each one and see what happens, then use the one you like best. You can copy the PDF or Word versions to your own computer (for example, if you want to read it later) by right-clicking on the link (i.e. use the right button on your mouse instead of the left one) and then choose 'Save Target As..." from the pop-up menu. You can also print SCAN out to your own printer if you wish.

As well as the latest issue, you can access any previous online issues. Those available are listed in the right-hand column of the SCAN page. If you are already on the Sherington web site, you will find 'SCAN' is now in the main menu at the top of each page. You can use that to go to the SCAN page, or access the latest issue.

You can also access SCAN on the ISSUU website by going to <a href="issuu.com/sherington">issuu.com/sherington</a> This is the Sherington home page and you will see pictures of the available SCAN issues across the middle of your screen. Just click on the one you wish to read. ISSUU is a global web site which now claims to have 10 million publications.

Mandy writes.....

I wonder if you have a favourite place where you go to for a bit of restoration and peace. Perhaps it is a favourite arm chair or a particular walk, a seat with a view over the sea, or by a river, or even in a quiet place in the garden, perhaps even the quiet of a church?

Sometimes we all need those opportunities to retreat to a place which restores us, a place where we can reflect or distance ourselves from the hurly burly of day to day existence. Now the Summer is here and the hope of warmer weather, it is good to build in time to step out of the action and slow our pace down.

Recently I came across a piece in a book which encouraged me to seek opportunities for rest and refection. I would like to share it with you this month. It is written by Ann Stewart from South Australia.

'We live next to a river, and across from our house three strong trees grow on the riverbank. In the evening I like to watch as flocks of ibis, cormorants, and other birds come to the trees to rest for the night. At times I have counted more than sixty birds flying into those trees and yet when they are settled, not one bird can be seen. The trees offer a safe place for the night.

Like those birds, we often need a safe place – some shelter during the storms that life inevitably brings. We need a place to hide when we feel weary and worn. Just as those trees are safe resting places for the birds, so is God a refuge for me and for you, always there, a 'hiding place'. In his sheltering presence we are refreshed and restored as we pray and read the Bible. When I look at those trees, I remember that God is always there for me – offering safety, rest, comfort and refreshment. And I am grateful.

I believe Ann is right, God does promise many times in the Bible that He is there for us, to provide shelter, strength, peace and comfort.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> psalm speaks of God as someone who will take us to a place of refreshment, 'he leads me beside quiet waters, he restores my soul.'

Jesus calls us to himself and promises rest 'Come to me,' he says 'all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.' Matthew 11 verse 28.

I hope that you get an opportunity this Summer to 're-charge your batteries' and perhaps a way to do that might be to link up with God and be charged up with his power and peace.

So I give you a prayer...

Dear Heavenly Father, in the busyness of life, in the good times and the bad, you are always with us. We come to you for protection and rest. Thank you. Amen.



### Sherington community-knitted blankets for

### Lathbury Manor Residential Care Home

Thank you so much to everyone knitting squares, to Pam Sims who has been sewing them into 11 square lengths and to Pam Fielding has been sewing the lengths into the finished blanket. Great teamwork everyone and much appreciated by the residents of the care home! We've just completed our 4<sup>th</sup> blanket. If you know of anyone else in need of a warm homemade blanket, please do let us know.

The square is knitted up diagonally across the square to make the shape firmer. Even if you are unable to make it to Afternoon Tea, but would like to add to our blanket, here are the details:

- 1. Needles: 3\( \frac{1}{4} \) or no.10
- 2. Double knitting wool (any colour)
- 3. 12 ins of wool are left either end of the square to use to sew the squares together.
- 4. Cast on 1 stitch
- 5. Knit into front and back of 1st stitch
- 6. Next row slip 1. Increase in next stitch
- 7. Knit to end
- 8. Repeat to 43 stitches (or however many you need to ensure the finished square will be **5 inches** square)
- 9. Next row slip 1, knit 2 together. Knit to end of row
- 10. Repeat this row until 1 stitch remains.
- 11. Cast off.



Walkers on the footpath from Crawley Grange to Dollars Grove will notice that the tall poplar trees that make up Alicea Wood are being felled. ### OPEN LETTER TO RIDING SCHOOLS/STABLES/INDIVIDUAL RIDERS IN NORTH CRAWLEY

Reports of horses being ridden on the verges and footpaths in and around the village have been received by the Parish Council numerous times, as well as by the police and Milton Keynes Council.

Concerns have been raised that the horses are damaging pavements and verges to the expense, ultimately, of residents who will bear the expense of repairing pavements.

We have been advised by the police that it is against the law (Section 72 of the Highways Act 1835) which states that a person is guilty of an offence if they wilfully ride an animal on a footpath or causeway by the side of the road, made or set apart for the use of foot passengers. Although this is an old Act, it can still be enforced.

Whilst we have concerns for the damage to the pavements we also have concerns for the riders many of whom are children, clearly, should a horse bolt or a vehicle noise frighten them the consequences do not bear thinking about. We are very lucky to live in a rural area with many bridal paths and, therefore, politely ask if these could be used rather than risk breaking the law by riding on pavements or taking unnecessary risks by riding on the North Crawley Road.

### **Trees**

Cllr Hatton reported that all the outstanding tree work had been completed satisfactorily.

### Parish Wardens

It appeared that Milton Keynes Council intend dispensing completely with their remaining Parish Warden posts. The Parish Council need to decide if they are prepared to contribute towards paying for their services next year and will discuss the matter at the next meeting.

### Drainage

A solution to the drainage problem is under way. The PC and Mr Boswell are now waiting for MKCouncil Legal Dept. to produce a contract for the works.

### Ward Councillor's Report

Cllr McLean reported that the decision day for the Ward Boundary changes is 25<sup>th</sup> June 2013 so we should have the result by our next meeting.

It was pointed out that it was a criminal offence to discharge fireworks on Parish Council land without prior permission.

The drainage issue for the recreation field continues, Cllr McLean will endeavour to get a result by our next meeting.

The residential safety plan is still being prepared by MKC and we need to have this information by our next meeting.

### **Cricket Nets**

There is to be be an official opening of the new cricket nets by Mark Lancaster MP at 5.30pm on Friday 7th June and everyone was welcome.

Cllr Flower confirmed that black netting was chosen rather than green as it had been shown to be less intrusive. The planting of trees or shrubs to hide the nets with their white sighting panels from view of the local residents is to be considered by North Crawley Cricket club at their next meeting. The NCCC will take over the responsibility of maintaining and insuring the nets.

### **NAG Report**

Cllr Hunt reported that the NAG should now be able to resurrect the SIDS to supplement 'Speedwatch' activities. There have been some thefts in the village recently namely a purse and mobile phone theft in the play area, several catalytic converters removed from vehicles and thefts of car number plates.

An inaugural Rural Communities Meeting was organised by PC Andy Perry of Thames Valley Police on 24<sup>th</sup> May held at Newport Pagnell Police Station. In attendance was Mr. Anthony Stansfeld our Police Commissioner, Chief Inspector Ed Mclean, Deputy Commander at CMK, and Inspector Angie Jones from TVP Kidlington as guest speakers. They all reinforced their commitment to rural policing although it was pointed out TVP had to reduce their costs by 20% over the next 4 years

### Councillor Items

Cllr Hatton reported that she had received various complaints from residents of Kilpin Green concerning parking of vehicles other than cars on their drives or in the road and the planting of hedges in front of their property.

There are covenants applying to all properties on the estate that restrict use to domestic purposes only and specifically prohibit the parking of trailers, caravans or boats. Fences and hedges are also prohibited. There are various other restrictions but, suffice to say, these are civil matters concerning private owners and are not matters on which the Parish Council can act. Our responsibility is limited to land or premises owned by the Parish Council.

### Sherington Synopsis by Jack Daw

I know that I am always going on about the weather but then, that is what the English are renowned for. I am sure we all really fed up with high winds and low temperatures, who would have expected to still be using the central heating from time to time in

the middle of 'flaming June'? We reckon that the gardens are about two weeks behind normal and my runner beans have only recently emerged from the earth but no doubt they will soon be climbing their poles and producing one of our most favourite crops. I got some young fruit trees a couple of years ago and for the first time it looks like I will have a decent crop of apples and cherries. For some reason though there is no blossom on the plum and the peach got leaf curl so likewise will produce nothing. The big success though is citrus, I have a lemon, orange and lime all of which blossomed in December – in my garage where I put them during the very cold weather – and they now live on my patio and are covered in small fruits. With any luck we might have something edible towards the end of the year.

By the time that you read this the 2013 Sherington Fête will have been held so more about that next month. However, I note that this year vintage or interesting vehicles will be part of the event and I shall be interested to see what turns up on the day. I know that a few people have some little treasures stashed away in their garages and would likely be proud to put them on display.

I personally was disappointed that some people have raised objections to the White Hart Beer and Sausage Festival, including someone who was not even resident in the UK at the time. I am aware that the police were called to a violent incident but that had nothing to do with the pub, it was related to a private party in Park Road. Keith and Co do their very best to ensure that the festival goes on in an orderly manner and it should not be forgotten how much they raise for Willen Hospice, £1,666 this year which is not an inconsiderable sum of money. It is inevitable that there is some noise and perhaps some inconvenience to some people but it does not last long, 3 days out of 365 should not be too much to ask.

I had an email from Martin Jeeves, caretaker of the Pavilion at the Perry Lane playing field. He had been contacted urgently by the duty operational manager for the East of England ambulance service NHS Trust because the ambulance service Benevolent Fund were doing a charity bike ride from Blackpool to Paris. They had noted that the

pavilion was very close to the A 509 and wondered if they could use it for a short stop for drinks, painkilling gel, loos, etc on Monday 27<sup>th</sup> May. Martin naturally agreed and set the room up for this purpose. 18 riders arrived at10.00 am and left again at about 11. Their next stop was Dunstable, then The Mall in London going on to Dartford and then Dover and expecting to reach Paris by Thursday. On the cross channel they would still have to pedal using static bikes so no rest there! They so far had raised £8,500 and hoped to improve upon this by the time they returned home.

Some news now of the Thumbsticks from Jack Sparrow that arrived too late to include last month:

May was to Weston Underwood and beyond. Beautiful fine spring morning but with hard and dry uneven ground – there must have been a dry spell for a day or so, (but I don't know when), thus making it difficult for some to maintain the rather faster pace than usual! We walked out through Ravenstone and almost on to the old railway track and then on a circular route back to the Alcove where we just missed the Rogation Day service being held there by minutes. Sitting in that alcove in the beautiful silence it is easy to imagine a "rose tinted" life in Cowper's time – but somehow not without the modern conveniences of our time – something as simple as rubber soled boots to keep your feet dry and socks and fleece, the list goes on. Lovely morning!

### Sherington and Milton Keynes Council make a stand against dog mess

### Help us to keep your local area dog mess free

Owners who fail to clear up their dog's mess are committing an offence, and it is a real concern within Sherington and across the Milton Keynes area.

Figures put the UK dog population at an estimated 8 million, producing 1,000 tonnes of faeces every day. As a community we need to work together to ensure dog fouling is reduced. If you witness a dog fouling incident within Sherington, please let us know the details of the location, time and a description of the dog and or owner.

To clamp down on the amount of dog mess left on public land, the Council is taking action. Under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, Sherington Parish Council and Milton Keynes Council have powers to ensure that our public open spaces are kept clean and free of dog mess.

### Dog mess and public health

It is important that dog mess is cleared, not only to keep our neighbourhoods clean, but also for public health reasons. Dog faeces can cause Toxicariasis, food poisoning and other diseases. Toxicariasis is an infection caused through contact with infected animal faeces that is often found in soil. Children are most susceptible to infections and in some cases it has been known to cause blindness, as was the case with 2-year-old Aimee Langdon from Manchester.

### What should dog owners do?

Council and parish officers are calling on dog owners to make sure that they take a few simple steps when out walking their pets:

- Always carry a supply of "pooh" bags or a poop-scooper.
- Watch your dog and clear up any mess they leave as soon as possible.
- Dispose of the mess responsibly. You can use any general waste bin or take it home and put it in your black sack.

Rob Ward, Milton Keynes Council's Neighbourhood Manager, advised: "Enforcement Officers are patrolling areas where this offence is happening on a regular basis, and issuing Fixed Penalty Notices to those who break the law."

Offenders are being issued with £50 Fixed Penalty Notices for failing to clear up after their dog. Those that don't pay up can expect to go to court and receive a fine of up to £1,000.
