Why do bad things happen to good people?

As I write, the sun is shining and we have been having an amazing summer, at least if you like it hot. Of course by the time you read this the heat of summer may be a distant memory, or you may be basking in an Indian summer. One thing is certain though, many people will be suffering. Some people will say some suffering is deserved. If you rob a bank and end up in gaol for instance. Or you smoke or take illegal drugs and end up with cancer or hepatitis C for example. But what if you are a 'good' person, have never smoked, and end up with lung cancer, or some terrible disease like motor neurone disease, or your partner is killed in a road crash. Often then people ask, maybe for the first time 'Where is God?'

In the last few weeks a passenger aeroplane has been shot out of the sky over Ukraine killing everybody on board including infants and children. Many were going on their summer holidays. Others were experts going to a conference on Aids. In Mosul (known as Nineveh in the bible and the place God told Jonah to go to) Christians are being told to leave or convert to Islam or die. This is religious cleansing which is barely making the news. In Israel and Palestine the slaughter goes on, mainly of civilians and innocent children. Around the world there are numerous injustices and much suffering which doesn't make the news over here. It maybe that you are suffering. Your suffering may not appear to an outsider to be that bad, especially compared to a Palestinian child who has been injured and orphaned, but to you it may be intolerable, and you may be asking 'Where is God?' You may be blaming God – 'Why has he given me this, or at least allowed it?'

Perhaps the first thing to say is that no one is good. I can hear you saying 'Oh but I know so and so who is a really good person', or maybe you think you are a good person yourself. Even Jesus said "No one is good—except God alone" (Mark 10:18). We also know that God made a good world. After creating the world "God saw all that he had made, and it was very good" (Gen 1.31). So what went wrong? Well we did. Woman and man went wrong. We rebelled against God and God kicked us out of the Garden of Eden which represented paradise. God had given us free will and we chose to use that free will to disobey God, so sin entered the world. Sin is not a very popular concept nowadays, but that doesn't make it any less real. The bible tells us that the consequence of sin is death. It was not God's intention for us to die. Other consequences of sin are sickness and evil being in the world. So in short we messed up big time. But the Good News is God did not abandon us to our sin and death. He sent us a saviour in Jesus who bore our sin and sickness, and suffered in ways that we will never know, finally by being crucified on a cross. But death could not hold him and God the Father raised him from the dead to new life. This new life is on offer to us today. In the face of our own suffering we can turn to Jesus knowing that he is one like us who has borne immense suffering. Jesus healed and raised from the dead some people as a sign of what is to come. If we put our trust in God today he can help us in the here and now. But the ultimate promise is that we will live with him for eternity.

In the 'Our Father' we are encouraged to pray 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. God's kingdom is breaking in to this world through the prayers and actions of his people. One day there will be no more suffering and no more tears. Do you want something to hope for? There is nothing more hopeful that the promise God has given us of what is to come:

'Then I saw "a new heaven and a new earth," for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any sea. 2 I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out

of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. ³ And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. ⁴ 'He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death' or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away.' (Rev 21).

One day all suffering will be gone. Until then we have a God who has walked this earth and suffered with us whom we can put our trust in and walk with Him until the day we will be at peace with Him for ever in heaven.

STWOOD

Well another month has passed and it is now quite noticeable that the evening sunsets are getting decidedly earlier and will certainly be so by the time you read this, also the mornings are also darker, unfortunately this means winter and Christmas is on its way!!!!

Before I forget unfortunately last month in the roll of honour for the graduates I should have included Elliot who I believe also received a 2.1, well done and apologies for my omission last month.

New arrivals into Cranfield Road are Austen, Kim, their children Lloyd and Lois and Tilly (Lloyd's girlfriend), and not forgetting their 2 dogs, Cookie and Chloe. I hope you enjoy your time in Astwood.

At the Parish Council meeting this month we had an enquiry from Derek Philips re broadband and Keith McLean our District Councillor thought it would be a good idea to contact Martyn A Smith the Infrastructure Coordination and Delivery at Milton Keynes Council, who replied as follows:

I've checked the rollout plans and Astwood is included as part of the final phase of our Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK) and Milton Keynes Council (MKC) broadband project

which we are running in conjunction with our local partners in Bedford Borough and Central Bedfordshire. This final rollout phase is scheduled to start towards the end of 2015.

Unfortunately, the final rollout phase will not provide guaranteed superfast broadband to your village as the final phase is designed to pick up areas that cannot receive the Government's guaranteed minimum service of 2 mb/s download speeds, rather than to provide superfast broadband which is defined as speeds in excess of 24 mb/s. However, even that modest uplift would be an improvement on your current service which appears to 0.5 mb/s or less.

On a more positive note, there are a number of other initiatives and solutions pending that may provide more hope of superfast broadband eventually reaching Astwood.

Superfast Extension Programme (SEP)

BDUK has announced a second stage to its broadband delivery project. This project is called the Superfast Extension Programme and MKC will once again matching money granted by the Government to help spread the reach of superfast broadband further than is possible with the money we have available at present. We hope to go out to tender towards the end of this year.

Cost savings elsewhere in MK

□ We do hope that through efficiencies in the current BDUK/MKC broadband rollout that we may have some additional money available to help the more rural areas. We don't yet know the scale of any efficiencies but those should become much clearer over the coming months.

Clawback from BT

□ If we achieve high levels of take up of superfast broadband services across the rest of the area we can claim a rebate on our investment from BT. This could be a significant sum and that money would also be re-invested in the network and could help areas such as yours.

Improving technology

☐ The technology available to deliver superfast broadband is developing all the time and is generally getting cheaper to produce. In a few years it may well be

possible to provide high quality superfast broadband services to many more rural areas, such as Astwood, at a much lower cost than is currently possible.

Milton Keynes Council is holding a broadband exhibition called "Get Connected" in the Middleton Hall on 13/14 September. Representatives from the Council and from our partners in Bedford and Central Beds will be there and they will be happy to answer any other questions you or your parishioners may have.

Although there is over a year to wait it is positive news of improvement to our broadband service. Furthermore Martyn Smith has also kindly agreed to attend our next Parish Council Meeting on the 29th October so if you would like to ask further questions, you are more than welcome to attend

Recently I had an archaeological survey done on my car park, to the rear of the 17th Century thatched bar and restaurant. It was amazing to find so much history attached!

A series of Medieval and post medieval pits were revealed, suggesting an ancient boundary. Due to a significant find of early pottery it is dated to the 13th century. Twenty-one shards of

ware were unearthed, the earliest being from the 11th century from factories where it was made in Olney Hyde, Pottersbury and Sandy Ware. They mainly consisted of cooking pots, jars, jugs and plates.

To date, these represent the most significant body of archaeological evidence for a 13th Century settlement at Astwood.

The Old Swan at Astwood Archaeological & Historic Background

The name Astwood derives from the Old English for 'east wood'. It is thought that the name was created by people living on the west side of Astwood, possibly in Hardmead, the latter possibly being the older settlement. There is no mention of Buckingham village by the name of Astwood in the Domesday survey 1086, though there are two properties which include the name in Moulsoe Hundred- Astwood Bury Manor and Astwood Manor. The survey recorded fourteen households inhabiting Astwood Manor, the heads of these households consisting of seven villains, six smallholders or cottages and a slave. The population may have been about five times this number. There was arable land sufficient for four plough teams, including one team for the demesne. Other assets consisted of meadow, woodland for 150 pigs and a mill. Prior to the conquest, the manor was held by Harold of Tyringham. At the time of the survey, the new owner and Tenant-in-chief was William, son of Ansculf and the lord of the manor was Wilbert.

Documentary references to the medieval settlement are sparse, nothing is known about its layout or its extent. The absence of a village in Astwood in the Domesday record may indicated that prior to the 11th century the parish was composed of widely dispersed farmsteads and homesteads and that these were later brought together to be centralized around the church and manorial site, surrounded by a system of planned open fields, perhaps involving a re-planning of existing settlement. This kind of large scale physical reorganization is understood to have been widespread through the Midlands region in the pre-Conquest period, although in some parts it appears to have occurred as late as the 12th and 14th century.

The base of an 'ancient' cross, which was once reported to have existed in the churchyard of St Peter's church, which may hint to a pre-Conquest foundation, although the earliest extant part of the church is its nave, which is believed to date from the 12th century. The chancel and south aisle of the building were built in the 14th century, the tower added in the 15th century and other additions were made in the 16th century. There are remains of a small moat about 400m East of the church, which is believed to be the site of the ancient manor house.

There are just two other vernacular buildings of historic interest within the village: a post-medieval vicarage, and Elm Farm Bar. Unfortunately many buildings have disappeared since the 19th century. They include Astwood Cottages, a row of three two story- timber framed structures on the north side of the Main Road.

HICHELEY

On the evening of August 4th almost 40 Chicheley villagers met in the village hall to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the day Great Britain entered the 1st World War. We began in our traditional way by having something to eat and drink whilst talking about personal memories and views of the war and its subsequent effect on our lives. At 10 p.m. we moved outside to the war memorial and lit 8 candles that had been placed around it in memory of the eight men associated with Chicheley who lost their lives during the conflict. A little later we made our way down to the church where those men would have worshipped, heard a reading of a poem written in 1914 which included the words we use on every Remembrance Sunday, then each lit and held a candle until the church clock struck 11 p.m. exactly 100 years after the war began in this country. After extinguishing the candles we made our way back to the war memorial, extinguished those candles and quietly returned to our homes. A much simpler commemoration perhaps than those held around the world but "we remembered".

August has so far continued to be a reasonably good month for the weather allowing, I understand, the harvest to proceed without to many hold-ups. Our own garden has been quite fruitful, I cannot comment on many of our other villagers, but hope they also are satisfied. It will soon be time to say thank you once again for our blessings.

A few items now for your diaries.

Chichchat will be on Tuesday 9th September from 10.30am until noon in the village hall. There will be also be a ChichTea, with cakes, on Tuesday 23rd September from 2.30pm until 4.00pm

The table top sale in Chicheley village hall on Saturday 13th September has had to be **postponed**. We hope to set another date later in the year.

The Bucks Historic Churches annual sponsored event is on Saturday 13th September. I have sponsorship forms if anyone wants to enter the event, which means riding, walking, and visiting local churches between 10.00am and 6.00pm. **Come to Chicheley and you can have a drink and biscuit to refresh you.**

Chicheley DCC meets on Thursday 18th September and the village hall annual general meeting is on Tuesday 23rd September at 8.00 p.m. All interested villagers are invited to the AGM which will be at 8 p.m in the village hall.

Looking further ahead we have a quiz on Saturday 4th October (see the notice), harvest festival on Sunday 12th October and the harvest supper on Saturday 18th October.

Much of the heap of stone chippings I mentioned last month has now been spread on the road between Newport Pagnell and Stoke Goldington and it looks fine, although there is still a lot in the lay-by ready for somewhere else. What would be good is if the highway authority could just mend some of the holes in the A422, Chicheley/Crawley Road and Hall Lane, which have also been reported, with the same efficiency. Perhaps when you read this all will be done.

Consultation on Draft Minerals Local Plan – Public Drop-In session Tuesday 2nd September 6.15pm Sherington Village Hall

Milton Keynes Council is consulting on the next stage of the preparation of a new Minerals Local Plan for the Borough. The consultation on the Draft Plan is the first opportunity for people to see an emerging plan and how everything fits together, and to object if the approaches in the plan are considered to be incorrect or if they could be improved. Matters are still open for consideration and it is not too late to challenge the plan where consultees have convincing arguments.

The Draft Plan and supporting documents can be viewed through the Council's website at http://www.milton-keynes.gov.uk/planning-and-building/planning-policy/minerals-policy

As part of the Draft Plan, a series of sites that the Council consider may be suitable for mineral extraction are identified, and it is proposed that these are allocated in the Final Plan. This consultation is a key time to make comments on the acceptability of identified sites (as well as the last opportunity to put new sites forward for consideration).

The potential sites identified near Sherington and Lathbury may be of particular interest to the residents of Sherington (you can see the proposed sites in Appendix 1 of the main consultation document at http://miltonkeynes-consult.objective.co.uk/file/3043870), so to give you the opportunity to discuss the issues with Council Officers, there will be a public drop-in session from 6.15pm ahead of the Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 2nd September, at the Village Hall in Sherington.






